Proposal Text:

Members of the Caucus are free to speak for themselves on any issues. In official letters, press releases, and other communications, our spokespeople and officers should refer to members of this Caucus using all of the following terms: gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, intersexed, and queer, and never use one or more without using all of them. The acronym GLBTIQ is also acceptable. This policy recognizes that the Caucus consists of a diverse membership the constituents of which embrace one or more of these above noted identities; and this acknowledges that no one such or set of several identities exclusive of all such can accurately describe the constituencies of this Caucus as a whole.

If an individual Caucus member, in interviews or communications, uses one or more identifying words without using the whole list, she or he should add (in a footnote or comment) that such word choice is not representative of the National Lavender Green Caucus and represents only his or her personal identity.

This policy shall, upon its ratification by the Caucus, replace previous word usage policy entitled "Use of the Word Queer in Official Communications".
